Hi Steve and Renny,

You raise some valid points and I'll try to give you a reasonable response.

The path was discussed in the January 2019 meeting when it was agreed that the council would obtain quotes for the work. At the March meeting the council decided to put work on the path on hold due to budgetary restraints. By May only one, very high, quote had been received; it was rejected and it was agreed that further quotes be sought. In July quotes had been received; one for £1809 was favoured, but further quotes were to be obtained, as extra funding needs to be sourced to pay for it. All this information is in the Parish Council minutes (<http://www.middletononthewolds.co.uk/minutes.aspx>).

The question remains as to why provision hasn't been made for the path, given that you raised it over two years ago. The answer is that, with the limited funds available to the council, other expenditure has been given priority. However, you can see from the above that it is now higher on the list.

I see your point about who would be liable for work done by volunteers and, to be honest, I haven't got an answer. As you say, there are different types of work that can be done by volunteers and they all have different levels of liability risk. The crux of the matter is that each task must be judged on its own merits. Clearly any such action on the footpath would need further consideration.

I hope this update has helped clarify the council's position on this matter. I would just like to point out that this response is from me as a councillor, not as editor of the Messenger. I think it is important to make the distinction.





LOCAL HISTORY

PARISH POLITICS

"Thursday night will be memorable in the history of the rural parishes of the East Riding and in fact in every part of England". This was the bold assertion of the Driffield Times in November 1894. Today it is difficult to find sufficient people to serve as parish councillors but for the first election the competition was cut-throat with 32 candidates for 11 seats. They were all male but need not have been as the struggle by women to vote for Parliament has obscured the fact that they could with certain restrictions vote for and indeed serve on Parish Councils. In Middleton, with the exception of Mrs Clements who served sporadically on the council at the end of the first war, the minutes reveal that there were no female members before 1940.

The East Riding County Council had been established in 1888 followed by district and parish councils which were designed to remedy the administrative chaos caused by having separate bodies, some recent creations, others remnants from previous centuries and as the new authorities were directly elected by secret ballot and with the votes of agricultural workers the domination of local affairs by the gentry was gradually challenged. Law enforcement had changed too with the creation of the County Police Force in 1856, while the stocks, that cure-all punishment from the past, was last used in Middleton in June 1854.

Top of the poll in Middleton's first parish council election was Arthur Brooksbank JP with 58 votes and bottom Philip Imeson, sexton, with 2. The others elected were W. Wilson, W.T. Hornby, and R Witty farmers, W. Hotham, seedsman, W Petch and Edmund Dooks joiners, A.E. Towse labourer, W. Wright veterinary surgeon, W. Thompson blacksmith, D. B. Soanes grocer and draper.

Robert Witty was elected chairman with nine votes, while Colonel Brooksbank only received two. William Wright was the vice chairman, A. Dooks the clerk with Mr Sharp of the York Union Bank as treasurer. Colonel Brooksbank was chairman for a few months in 1897 and his son held the position from 1910 until his death in 1917. For years meetings, which were less frequent than today, were held in the school and matters discussed by the parish council included pits, allotments, charities, pumps, lighting, guide posts and street sweeping - not much different from today's concerns.

The coming of the motor transport in the 20th century and the modernising of roads that had scarcely been adequate for an earlier age was just one of the problems that the County Council needed to address. Education was another and later electricity and piped water supplies.

The Parish Council played its part as a watch dog informing the County of its concerns as in 1923 when following a request by G. Eastwood and D. B. Soanes it asked the County Council to adopt a speed limit of 5 miles per hour through the village for motor traffic - did it ever happen?

In October 1944 the Parish Council considered the provision of a playing field for the village as a memorial to the men and women serving in the forces and set up a committee to raise money In 1950 the football and cricket pitches were ready for play.

Forty years after their inception an Oxford historian referred to the enthusiasm with which the first councils were elected and the cruel disillusionment when it was found that everything which they had a mandate to do was beyond their purses. Maybe, but they succeeded in the original aim of separating church matters which the Vestry continued to manage and all other basic village concerns.



Summer is almost at an end, and the prospect of long dark evenings, and miserable wet afternoons, looms on the horizon.

So, what to do on those afternoons and evenings, in order to get some gentle exercise and socialise with other people (most of who will be from the village).



COME AND TRY INDOOR BOWLS at Middleton Indoor Bowls Club. No previous experience is necessary. 'Coaching' will be available for anyone. We have just one young player – Harry Newlove, 18 years. He is in need of some other younger players who can create a challenge for him. So, young people put away those mobiles and computers for a couple of hours. Come and see if you can beat Harry.

Middleton Indoor Bowls facility will restart on 1st September, although if anyone wishes to 'give-it-a-go' during August we will try to accommodate them. The Club has two full size rinks. The building is heated, has a seating/viewing area, and a kitchen with coffee/tea making facilities.

This village facility is available to anyone for occasional use. The only stipulation is the use of flat smooth soled footwear. The charge, to non-Club members, is £ 3-50p per person per two hour session. For Club Members our annual subs are £5 (YES, only five pounds) per year, with sessions costing only £3 per person.

Our Indoor afternoon 'Aussie' Pairs, Evening Pairs and afternoon Triples Leagues will commence at the beginning of October. These Leagues are for Club members, but anyone can become a Club member. The Leagues are a great way to experience, and improve, your bowls. The Leagues are played in a friendly manner, and range in skill from novice to advanced. OATY BISCUITS

Makes Approx 25

170g butter

70g golden syrup

1 tbsp milk

170g plain flour

170g caster sugar

170g oats

1 level teasp bicarb

Method:

Heat butter, milk and syrup (do not boil)

Pour over dry ingredients and mix well

Roll into balls and put on baking tray

Flatten slightly and bake for approx 15 minutes at gas 4, fan 160C

Cool on tray, then on a rack

If you can resist eating them, they freeze well



LOCAL BIRDS & WILDLIFE

It's been a busy time in the village since the last newsletter, with young birds frantically chasing their parents around begging for food, butterflies springing into life between bouts of fearsome weather, and bats, owls and hedgehogs taking over the gardens after the rest have gone to bed.

Becky in Orchard Drive reports that "...three very chunky hedgehogs have been in the garden every night keeping the slugs at bay! There seems to be a lot of frogs this year too, maybe the wet weather is treating them well? But we don't have a pond - yet!" She also has a Greater Spotted Woodpecker visiting, and Tree Sparrows nesting in an old House Sparrow nesting spot - "I didn't know they nested in houses, but they are clearly a resourceful bunch - just as well given their status!"

I chose the books for August as they were easy, holiday reads. I like to read a story set in the place I am to visit and found **“A Piano in the Pyrenees”** by **Tony Hawks**, not realising that he was a comedian and panellist on programmes like Have I Got News For You and Just a Minute.



It is a gently amusing read about him buying a house on a whim when on a skiing trip so that he has somewhere to practice the piano. Then he decides to take his own piano from England. We hear about the disastrous journey in a white van and all the problems he has installing a swimming pool. Various friends visit, he gets to know his neighbours and all the while he is looking for his soulmate. Those who read it enjoyed it but we understand that his first book “Round Ireland with a Fridge” is his best so I will be trying that next - I may have to plan a visit to Ireland...

The second book, **“The Inaugural Meeting of the Fairvale Ladies Book Club”** by **Sophie Green** is set in the 1970s’ Northern Territories of Australia and brings together 5 very different women to discuss books and life (much the same as ours). The difference with theirs is the huge distances they have to go - 2 hours by truck from the town - plus they can only meet in the dry season as there is no travelling to the cattle ranch in the wet.

We see life on the ranch, follow a nurse with the Flying Doctors, sympathise with a young mother of 3 with an abusive husband and with an American girl’s love for an Aboriginal ranch hand. Again it was enjoyed by those who had read it and we recommend it.

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Meet our wonderful Sarmila Bhele. Sarmila keeps us all straight at our new workshops in the ancient city of Bhaktapur. Bhaktapur is a UNESCO World Heritage Site and is about 8 miles east of Kathmandu in Nepal. Sarmila is the leader of a group of about 25 knitters who live in the area and work from home and our new workshops.

Sarmila is 31 years old and is married to Rameshwar and they have an 11 year old son called Aayan. Rameshwar is the owner operator of his own bus in and around Kathmandu. Black Yak pays for Aayan's schooling in a local school. We could not operate our new workshop without Sarmila. She goes through the orders that we send over and distributes them, with wool and knitting instructions, to our knitters. She then performs magic and collects all the knitting back in and somehow manages to get it all back to our main unit for sorting, checking and finishing.
